- Are we supposed to judge people? Would God tell us to stop judging others if it were not possible?
- What does it mean not to judge? Does the Bible say we are not to make judgment on anything?
- Who has the Father committed all judgment to? Jn. 5:22
- What does it mean to have discernment?
- Do you understand the difference between judgment, which only God can render, and discernment?
- What is the purpose of judges in our legal system?

## THE PRINCIPLES OF THE RIGHTEOUSNESS OF GOD - Romans 1:18-8:39

Principle #1 - CONDEMNATION - <u>1:18-3:20 – We will look at three of them</u> A. CONDEMNATION OF THOSE WHO <u>REJECT THE REVELATION OF GOD</u> -ROMANS 1:18-32 (We've already looked at this) "Without excuse -- God gave them up!"

- <u>This session</u>: B. CONDEMNATION OF THOSE <u>WHO REBUKE OTHERS WHILE IGNORING</u> <u>THEIR OWN DEEDS</u> - ROMANS 2:1-16
   C. CONDEMNATION OF THOSE <u>WHO RELY UPON THEIR OWN STANDARDS</u> <u>OF RIGHTEOUSNESS -</u> ROMANS 2:17-3:8 (This really hits the religious persons!)
- B. CONDEMNATION OF THOSE <u>WHO REBUKE OTHERS WHILE IGNORING</u> <u>THEIR OWN DEEDS</u> - ROMANS 2:1-16
- This session: 1B. Makes them INEXCUSABLE before a just God 1-3
  2B. Makes them INSENSITIVE to their own need v. 4
  3B. Makes them INATTENTIVE to the basis of God's judgment vv. 5-11
  4B. Makes them IGNORANT of the judgment of God vv. 12-16

Rom 2:1 *Therefore you are <u>inexcusable</u>*, O man, whoever you are who <u>judge</u>, for in whatever <u>you judge another you condemn yourself</u>; for you who judge practice the same things.

Rom 2:2 But we know that the **judgment of God is according to truth** against those who practice such things.

Rom 2:3 And do you think this, O man, you **who judge those practicing such things**, and **doing the same**, that **you will escape the judgment of God**?

Same word as 1:20 – "*without excuse*"

The English words for "*judge*" (8 different forms of the word) appear 758 times in the Bible, of which 201 times are found in the N.T.

The word "*discern*" or "*discernment*" is found in its forms 25 times, of which 9 times are found in the NT. <u>We are to discern, we are not to judge!!!!</u>

There are two primary Greek words used: <u>"judge"</u> - *krino* (making a judgment that results in a verdict or decision that only God can render - in its various forms appears 167 times in NT

<u>"discern"</u> - *diakrino* - in its forms appears 25 times in NT<sup>-</sup> - "*dia*" – *between two things!* (We are not to make a decision about someone else, but we are to be discerning!) Do we not have a natural habit of judging others? Is this not a common problem among us all? Meaning here – "administration of what is right and fair"

The noun form of <u>"judge"</u> - *krisis* is used 48 times in the NT, and refers to the decision or <u>the verdict</u> <u>that has already been rendered.</u> – that is why the Bible says we are not to make a judgment on

anything! <u>God makes all judgments!</u> That is why we need Godly judges! <u>This is a common problem</u> <u>among all of us</u>. And <u>how the evil one uses this (that attitude of all of us-judging others) to</u> <u>discourage us!</u> *Cf. Prov. 18:13* You and I have a natural habit of judging others!

The Lord is called "*the righteous judge*" in <u>2 Tim. 4:8</u> and <u>Hebrews 12:23</u> speaks of God as "*the Judge* of all."

Jesus is called (<u>Acts 10:42</u>) "the Judge of quick and dead," and <u>John 5:22</u> says "<u>For the Father judges</u> no one, but has committed all judgment to the Son."

In <u>verse 27</u> we read, "And has given Him authority to execute judgment also, because He is the Son of Man."

<u>Romans 14:10</u> and <u>2 Cor. 5:10</u> speak of the "judgment seat of Christ." <u>Psalm 50:6</u> says "for God is Judge Himself." <u>1 Cor. 4:5</u>

We are also told – *Heb. 4:12* - that the Word of God is a "*discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart* (Greek: *kritikos* – "critic")."

<u>Matthew 7:1-5</u> tells us not to "*judge*" lest we be judged. The reason given is that <u>it makes us blind to</u> <u>our own faults.</u>

John 7:24 warns us "Do not judge <u>according to appearance</u>, but judge with righteous judgment." Obviously, we are wrong when we draw conclusions based on outward appearance. An example is in James 2:1-4 – good illustration!

The warning about judging others is powerfully given to us in this same book of <u>Romans 14:4</u> says "Who are you to judge another man's servant; <u>Verse 10</u> says, "But why do you judge your brother? Or why do you show contempt for your brother? For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ." <u>Verse 13</u> this summary: "<u>Therefore let us not judge one another any more</u>, but rather resolve this, not to put a stumbling block or a cause to fall in our brother's way."

In <u>Colossians 2:16-17</u> we are told "So <u>let no one judge you</u> in food or in drink, or regarding a festival or a new moon or Sabbaths, which are a shadow of things to come, but the substance is Christ."" <u>James 4:12</u> asks the question "<u>Who are you to judge another</u>?"

This issue of judging others must be a big thing with God because it's mentioned so much!!

## 1C. Their Practices condemn them

Rom 2:1 Therefore you are inexcusable, O man, whoever you are <u>who judge</u> (pass an <u>unfavorable judgment upon, criticize, find fault with, condemn</u>), for in whatever you <u>judge</u> (administration of what is right and fair) another you <u>condemn</u> (judicial pronouncement upon a guilty person) yourself; for you **who judge practice the same things**.

"practice the same things" The word "judge" is a compound verb <u>"to judge down"</u> - katakrineis -Romans 8:1 uses the same word and says that there is <u>no condemnation</u> to those who are believers in Jesus Christ. - cf. John 3:16-18 Classic illustrations-<u>2 Sam. 12:1-7a</u>; (You are the man!) John 8:1-11 What wonderful illustration!

2C. The Principle of God's judgment will condemn them

*Rom 2:2* But *we know* (are sure!) that the judgment of God is *according to truth* against those who practice such things.

"according to truth" - cf. Hebrews 3:12-13

"we know" - Greek: oidamen - "know" Psalm 9:4 speaks of God sitting in His throne and "judging in righteousness" Verses 7-8 declare that "<u>He shall judge the world in righteousness</u>." Psalm 96:13 says "He shall judge the world with righteousness, and the peoples with His truth (cf. <u>Psa. 98:9</u>)." Revelation 19:2 says "<u>For true and righteous are His judgments</u>."

3C. The **Possibility of escaping God's judgment is a fallacy of their own thinking** 

Rom 2:3 And <u>do you think this</u>, O man, you who judge those practicing such things, and doing the same, that you will escape the judgment of God?

"do you think this..." Cf. <u>Psalm 50:20-21</u> - cf. <u>Hebrews 2:1-4; 12:25-29</u>

You do not escape God's judgment! But! Romans 8:1 – He bore our sins! All of them! He took my judgment! For me and for you! Hallelujah!!! There is no condemnation for those in Christ!!!!
