3B. It EXPERIENCES discernment for yourself - 14:22-23

• <u>1B. It generally EXCLUDES judgment (passing sentence) of others - 14:1-12</u>

Consider the Greek words used in the NT for "judge, judgment" or "judging"

(1) Krino - to decide, conclude, determine, pass sentence - used over 160 times cf. Mt. 7:1

(2) Anakrino - to ask questions, examine, evaluate, discern - used 17 times (once as a noun) - cf. <u>1 Cor.</u> <u>2:14-15</u>

(3) *Diakrino* - to discern, to make a distinction, to see through the judgment - used 22 times - cf. *Rom.* 14:23

Rom 14:1 Receive one who is *weak in the faith*,

NOTE: Who is the one "weak in the faith"?

- (1) It does not say "weak in faith"
- (2) It does not say "weak in morals
- (3) It says "weak in the faith" those doctrines of our salvation and freedom in Jesus Christ
- (4) It says they have a "weak conscience" 1 Cor. 8:1-13
- (5) It says they have the following characteristics:
 - Rom. 14:2 "eats only vegetables" NIV & NASB says that he "eats vegetables"
 - Rom. 14:15 "grieved" NIV "distressed"

Rom. 14:21 - "stumbles" and "offended"

Rom. 14:23 - "doubts"

Rom. 15:1 – "scruples of the weak"

- 1C. When is it Right to judge?
 - ✓ 1D. We are to judge (anakrino) all things -1 Cor. 2:15
 - ✓ 2D. We are to judge the spirits (anakrino) <u>1 John 4:1</u>
 - ✓ 3D. We are to judge (diakrino) between fellow believers who have a dispute <u>1 Cor.</u>
 <u>6:5</u>

- ✓ 4D. We are to judge those living in sin who refuse to repent (krino) <u>1 Cor. 5:12-13</u> (still in sin, still in rebellion, refusing to repent)
- ✓ 5D. We are to judge with righteous judgment (krino) John 7:24 never based on appearance (Ref. Jesus' Sabbath healing of the lame man at the Pool of Bethesda)
- ✓ 6D. We are to judge ourselves (diakrino) <u>1 Cor. 11:31</u>
- 2C. When is it Wrong to judge?

Rom 14:1 Receive one who is <u>weak in the faith</u>, but <u>not to disputes over doubtful things</u>. Rom 14:2 For one believes he may eat all things, but he who is weak <u>eats only vegetables</u>. Rom 14:3 Let not him who eats <u>despise</u> him who does not eat, and let not him who does not eat <u>judge him who eats</u>; for God has received him.

- ✓ 1D. When our disagreements with other believers are over "doubtful things" non essentials- (no proof of sin) 1 Greek: diakriseis dialogismon dialogue or argument about what is right or wrong about that which Bible does not call "sin.". This is always wrong!
- ✓ 2D. When we think we are better than others or our position is the only correct one to consider "despise" Greek: exoutheneito cf. <u>Matt. 7:1-5</u> (we usually do not see our own faults) <u>This is so easy to do!!</u>

Rom 14:4 Who are you to judge another's servant? To his own master he stands or falls. Indeed, he will be made to stand, *for God is able* to make him stand.

✓ 3D. When we try to play God – 4 - cf. James 4:11-12(krino) We have no business doing this!

Rom 14:5 One person esteems one day above another; another esteems every day alike. <u>Let each</u> <u>be fully convinced in his own mind.</u>

✓ 4D. When we don't respect the opinions and convictions of others – 5 - Issue is "days" - cf. Galatians 4:10-11 and Colossians 2:16-17(krino) How often do you find yourself arguing with others who have different opinions and convictions of other?

Rom 14:6 He who observes the day, <u>observes it to the Lord</u>; and he who does not observe the day, <u>to the Lord he does not observe it.</u> He who eats, <u>eats to the Lord</u>, for he gives God thanks; and he who does not eat, <u>to the Lord he does not eat</u>, and gives God thanks.

✓ 5D. When we question the motives of others - 6 - cf. <u>1 Cor. 4:3-5</u> (anakrino) Don't question the motives of others!

Rom 14:7 For none of us lives to himself, and no one dies to himself. Rom 14:8 **For if we live, we live to the Lord**; and **if we die, we die to the Lord**. **Therefore, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's.** Rom 14:0 For to this and Christ died and nose and lived again that the might be Lord of both

Rom 14:9 For to this end Christ died and rose and lived again, <u>that He might be Lord of both</u> <u>the dead and the living.</u>

✓ 6D. When we doubt a person's relationship to the Lord - 7-9

<u>SUMMARY: 1 Cor. 2:10-16</u> ARE YOU ONE <u>WHO JUDGES ANOTHER</u> AND <u>LETS GOD LOVE THEM</u>. <u>OR?</u> <u>ARE YOU ONE</u> <u>WHO LOVES THEM</u> AND <u>LETS GOD JUDGE THEM?</u>
