# HEROD'S VIOLENCE TO THE CHURCH -

**VS.1-4** 

Act 12:1 Now about that time Herod the king stretched out his hand to harass some from the church.

Act 12:2 Then he killed James the brother of John with the sword.

Act 12:3 And because he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded further to seize Peter also. Now it was during the Days of Unleavened Bread.

Act 12:4 So when he had arrested him, he put him in prison, and delivered him to four squads of soldiers to keep him, intending to bring him before the people after Passover.

# PETER FREED FROM PRISON - VS. 5-19

Act 12:5 Peter was therefore kept in prison, but constant prayer was offered to God for him by the church.

Act 12:6 And when Herod was about to bring him out, that night <u>Peter was sleeping</u>, bound with two chains between two soldiers; and the guards before the door were keeping the prison. v. 2 James, **one of the sons of thunder**, the sons of Zebedee. He was in the inner circle with Jesus. He, his brother John and Peter were chosen by Jesus for special occasions...**Mt. of Transfiguration**; **raising of Jairus' daughter**; **praying in Gethsemane**. So one of the three that was chosen by Jesus to be a part of the inner circle, he with his brother John and Peter. So Herod killed James with a sword. He beheaded him. – cf. <u>Mark 10:35-40</u>

*v.3* Now according to the tradition, **no one was to be tried or no one was to be put to death during the holiday of Unleavened Bread.** 

v. 4 So he put Peter in prison and he delivered him to four quaternions (16) of soldiers. In Peter's case he was chained to two guards, one on either side. Then there was another guard at the door of the cell, another guard at the door of the ward of the prison. And thus there were four guards constantly on duty watching Peter, intending to bring him before the people after Passover; after the Feast of Unleavened Bread, because then they could legally again have a trial. How bleak the situation must have looked! Even hopeless! There appeared no possibility of Peter's escape. What could the little community of Jesus, in its powerlessness, do against the armed might of Rome?

The answer of course, is TO PRAY!!!

Notice Seven essentials mentioned in this passage for effective prayer:

#1 – v. 5 **The need!** There is real need here! James killed; Peter imprisoned! – *cf. Ex. 2:23-25; Phil. 4:19* 

#2 – v.5 There is **continual fervency**! Constant prayer by people who believe that God can! –; *Luke 11:5-13; 18:1-8* 

Notice the contentment of Peter – he was sleeping soundly!! <u>Phil</u> <u>4:6-7</u> We've been seeing one marvelous conversion after another – the three thousand on the Day of Pentecost, the Samarians, the Ethiopian eunuch, Saul of Tarsus, the Gentile centurion Cornelius and the mixed crowd in Antioch. The Word of God was spreading, now we see a serious

setback in the death of James and the imprisonment of Peter, both of whom were apostles and leaders of the Jerusalem church.

Herod Agrippa I was the tyrant responsible for this double assault upon the work of God. It must have seemed like a time of grave crisis, but we also the marvelous rescue of Peter by the intervention of God.

Thus **the destructive power of Herod** and **the saving power of God** are **contrasted**. Indeed throughout church history the pendulum has swung between expansion and opposition, growth and shrinkage, advance and retreat, although the assurance that even the powers of death and hell will never prevail against Christ's church, since it is built securely on the rock, Jesus Christ!

#### HEROD THE KING! - HEROD AGRIPPA 1

Herod the king was Herod Agrippa 1. He was the grandson of Herod the Great. He shared some of his grandfather's characteristics and after the emperors Caligula and Claudius had given him successive portions of Palestinian territory, his kingdom was as extensive as his grandfather's.

v. 5 Peter was therefore kept in prison, but constant (ektenes – without ceasing, fervent) prayer was offered to God for him by the church.

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Act 12:7 Now behold, an angel of the Lord stood by him, and a light shone in the prison; and he struck Peter on the side and raised him up, saying, "Arise quickly!" And his chains fell off his hands. Act 12:8 Then the angel said to him, "Gird yourself and tie on your sandals"; and so he did. And he said to him, "Put on your garment and follow me." Act 12:9 So he went out and followed him, and did not know that what was done by the angel was real, but though he was seeing a vision. Act 12:10 When they were past the first and the second guard posts, they came to the iron gate that leads to the city, which opened to them of its own accord; and they went out and went down one street, and immediately the angel departed from him. Act 12:11 And when Peter had come to himself, he said, "Now I know for certain that the Lord has sent His angel, and has delivered me from the hand of Herod and from all the expectation of the Jewish people." Act 12:12 So, when he had considered this, he came to the house of Mary, the mother of John whose surname was Mark, where many were gathered together praying. Act 12:13 And as Peter knocked at the door of the gate, a girl named Rhoda (Rose) came to answer.	<ul> <li>#3 - vs. 7-12 There is Divine intervention - <u>Acts 12:7-12</u></li> <li>God is not bound to methods. 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HEROD'S VIOLENT DEATH – VS. 20-24 – WHAT GLORIFIES GOD! Act 12:20 Now Herod had been very angry with the people of Tyre and Sidon; but they came to him with one accord, and having made Blastus the king's personal aide their friend, they asked for peace, because their country was supplied with food by the king's country. Act 12:21 So <u>on a set day</u> Herod, arrayed in royal apparel, sat on his throne and gave an oration to them. Act 12:22 And the people kept shouting, "The voice of a god and not of a man!" Act 12:23 Then immediately an angel of the Lord struck him, because he did not give glory to God. And he was eaten by worms and died. Act 12:24 But the word of God grew and multiplied. BARNABAS AND SAUL APPONTED – V. 25 Act 12:25 And Barnabas and Saul returned from Jerusalem when they had fulfilled their ministry, and they also took with them John whose surname was Mark.	<ul> <li>V. 21 <u>"on a set day"</u> According to Josephus, it was the second day of the games celebrated in honor of Claudius. The place was the theatre Caesarea. Josephus says he was clothed in a robe made entirely of silver. Herod died at the age of 54, in the 7<sup>th</sup> year of his reign (3<sup>rd</sup> year of his reign over Judea). He lingered for 5 days, suffering excruciating torments, being eaten with worms.</li> <li>Taking or stealing God's glory! – cf. <u>Is. 42:8; Acts 3:11-13; Acts 14:11-16</u>. Now the danger for the person who is exercising those gifts of the Holy Spirit is, the danger is that they start sometimes receiving the adulation, the admiration from the crowd. The moment you begin to receive, the credit or you begin to accept the adulation, your ministry is in a very precarious position. In Acts 3:11 notice how Peter immediately disassociates himself from the miracle. He corrects them immediately. Why look so intently at us as though as by our own power or godliness we had made this man walk? We didn't have anything to do with it. Why do you look at us? Then he begins to explain the miracle that they saw. The men that God uses are men who have come to the cross in their own lives. They are men who have come to the cross in their own lives. The same with Paul and Barnabas in Acts 14:11.</li> <li>My chains are gone! I've been set free!</li> <li>My God, my Savior has ransomed me! It closes with Herod dead, Peter free and the word of God triumphing! Such is the power of God to overthrow hostile human plans and to establish His own in their place!!
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
